Professor of Public Economics at the University of Milan. He has been awarded a Jean Monnet Chair of Economics of European Integration, an 'Ad Personam' Jean Monnet Chair in EU Industrial Policy, and he currently is the coordinator of a Jean Monnet Network of six European universities. He has been involved in evaluations for the EC, the European Parliament, the EIB, the OECD, the World Bank and other institutions. Founder and honorary president of CSIL Centre for Industrial Studies, Florio has been the scientific director of the EC "Guide to Cost-benefit analysis of investment projects". His recent books include "Network Industries and Social Welfare" (OUP 2013), "Applied Welfare Economics" (Routledge 2014), and two edited books: "The economics of infrastructure provisioning" (MIT Press 2015), "Infrastructure finance in Europe" (OUP 2016). Prof. Dr. Dres. h.c. Arnold Picot is the director of the Institute for Information, Organization and Management at the Munich School of Management, Ludwig-Maximilians-University Munich, since 1988. His primary research fields are industry and corporate organization and the strategic management of technology, information and innovations. He specifically covers research topics in telecommunications and media, including regulatory issues. Until 1984, he was professor for corporate management and organization at the University of Hannover, between 1984 and 1987 he held a chair at the Technical University of Munich. He holds honorary doctoral degrees of Bergakademie Freiberg (1998) und the University St. Gallen (2002). Besides being amicus curiae for several federal and state departments, Prof. Picot is chairman of the academic committee for regulatory issues at the federal regulatory authority for telecommunications and postal services. He is member of the board of trustees of the Alcatel SEL Foundation for Communication Research, media advisor of the Bertelsmann Foundation, advisor of the Fraunhofer Group Information and Communication Technology, chairman of the board of the Münchner Kreis (International Association for Communication Research) and member of several other academic associations, i.a. of the Bavarian Academy of Science. He specialises in the economics and policy of nuclear power, liberalisation and privatisation of the electricity and gas industries, and trade policy on network energy industries. He is member of the Public Services International Research Unit (PSIRU) at the University of Greenwich Business School, as energy policy expert since 2001. Before moving to the University of Greenwich, Professor Thomas was a member of the Science Policy Research Unit at the University

of Sussex from 1979-2000 in the Energy Policy Programme. He serves on the editorial boards several periodicals including Energy Policy, Utilities Policy, Energy and Environment, and International Journal of Regulation and Governance. In recent years, his research has included: an evaluation of the economics of nuclear power; an assessment of the impact of the marketisation of essential services on low-income consumers; an assessment of the European Commission's Directives aimed at opening the electricity sector in Europe to competition; an assessment of the South African government's attempts to develop a new design of nuclear power plant; a review of the corporate policies of the major European energy utilities; and a review of methods of funding nuclear power decommissioning liabilities.
